Overview

Develop Strategies to Advance Equitable Development

Community planning methods typically do not work in a vacuum; many planners pull inspiration and ideas from other communities across the country. Planners can identify promising practices that fit their community and transform those methods into actionable strategies to drive change. It's important for planners to understand their communities and partners prior to identifying practices because not all ideas will work across all communities.

Understanding the capacity of organizations, government, and coordination between groups is important in identifying and evaluating which methods and strategies should be pursued. This workbook includes information to **Evaluate Promising Practices**, **Build Consensus and Strategies**, and **Move Towards Action**.



Workbook 3 Activities

Workbook activities include guiding questions that are designed to help you and your partners brainstorm about equity within your systems. Use these activities during an internal or community planning session and send questions to colleagues or partners to aid their thinking on the creation and implementation of a program or partnership idea.

The exercises across these activities aren't meant to be an exhaustive list of things to consider as you are planning. Instead, they are a helpful guide to centering equity within community planning and strategy work.

There is no one-size fits all approach. The approach to equitable community planning will depend on community context, strengths, and goals.

Once key strategies are identified, creating a plan to put them into action is essential.

Build Consensus and Strategies

Equitable development looks different from community to community, and there is no one-size-fits-all approach to inclusive engagement and building consensus around strategies.

Determining the mix of strategies will depend on your community, its strengths, its needs, and goals. How broad and impactful your efforts will be depends on existing capacity – financial resources or strong partnerships – and the willingness to enact change.

Thoughtful engagement and inclusive planning are essential to building consensus around strategies. One approach to prioritizing strategies and arriving at consensus is sorting specific strategies by their urgency and importance. This decision-making tool helps focus effort on long-term, overall goals by providing a framework to prioritize what's important.

How do potential strategies – either those gleaned from promising practices or proposed by local community members – fit into this framework of urgency and importance?
